ITEM 6. PUBLIC ACKNOWLEDGE OF NON-AGENDA MATTERS

ITEM 7. CORRESPONDENCE AND RELATED INFORMATION

The first article was from City Watch LA regarding Los Angeles Mayor Garcetti announcing a goal to recycle 100% of the city's wastewater by 2035. This gives more detail on his aggressive plan to do that. The cost for this project is approximately \$8 billion. The second article was from Elsinore Valley MWD regarding Senate Bill 669 Safe Drinking Water Trust. This creates a Trust, as opposed to taxing all the water purveyors. Those are for water agencies that need reliable safe drinking water. The next article was from Maven's Notebook regarding Congressman Kevin McCarthy introducing legislation to repurpose high-speed rail funding to water infrastructure projects. Mr. Lopez passed out from Jurupa Unified School District the Resolution that was recently adopted on the power lines that Edison and the City of Riverside are proposing in the area. The note was for board members and days.

ITEM 8. MANAGER'S REPORT

Operations Report:

There was nothing unusual to report under operations. We are not selling as much water as we do in dry years, which is typical in wet years. That will go up in when the weather heats up.

Emergency and Fire Report:

The Incident Report for February 1 – February 28, 2019 there were a total of 244 calls, in comparison to the same period in 2018, there were a total of 251 calls. The year to date total is 516, compared to 553 in 2018.

ITEM 9. Receive and File Statement of Cash Asset Schedule Ending February 2019. DM 2019-10.

BACKGROUND

Attached for the Board of Directors' consideration is the November 2018 Statement of Cash Asset Schedule Report for all District Fund Accounts. Our YTD interest is \$2761,022.00 for District controlled accounts. With respect to District "Funds in Trust", we show \$12,153.00 which has been earned and posted. The District has a combined YTD interest earned total of \$283,175.33 as of February 28, 2019.

With respect to the District's Operating Funds (Excluding Restricted Funds and Operating Reserves), we show a balance of \$5,656,665.00 ending January 31, 2019. That's **\$302,162.00 LESS** than July 1, 2018, beginning balance of \$5,958,827.00.

Further, the District's Field/Admin Fund current fund balance is just over \$450,000.00.

Submitted for the Board of Directors consideration is the *February 2019, Statement of Cash Asset Schedule Report* for your review and acceptance this afternoon.

ITEM 10. Consideration to Award RCSD Weed Abatement Contract for Calendar Year 2019. DM 2019-11.

BACKGROUND

On March 5, 2019, the Rubidoux Community Services District (District) received one (1) sealed bid for this year's abatement contract work. Historically the District receives only two bids; the competing bidders traditionally are Scott Tractor and Jim DeGuire Weed Abatement. This year the District's sole bidder for weed abatement services was DeGuire Weed Abatement.

Additionally, as in past years, the "Notice Inviting Proposals" was noticed in the Press Enterprise Newspaper on February 14 and 21, 2019.

Below is the sum aggregate unit price of DeGuire Weed Abatement Bid.

The District determines valuation of the bid submitted adding each submitted unit cost. Consequently, the apparent low bidder for the 2019 Weed Abatement Service Contract is DeGuire Weed Abatement with an aggregate bid amount of \$264.40.

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World Water Day Message from SAWPA – Tap Water is Rigorously Tested and Safe to Drink

World Water Day is an annual United Nations observance day that highlights the importance of freshwater. The day is used to advocate for the sustainable management of freshwater resources and is celebrated around the world with a variety of events. Events are celebrated through educational, theatrical and musical events or may include lobbying to spread this year's message that whoever you are, wherever you are, water is your human right.

The Santa Ana Watershed Project Authority (SAWPA), which stretches some 75 miles from the San Bernardino Mountains to the Pacific Ocean in Orange County, is celebrating World Water Day by educating its customers that the tap water that comes to their home is safe to drink. All tap water in Southern California and across the United States undergoes mandatory daily testing at certified laboratories to ensure it meets or exceeds standards. The Safe Drinking Water Act requires that public tap water providers conduct comprehensive water quality testing by certified laboratories as well as provide annual water quality reports to its customers.



"Billions of people around the world are still living without safe, clean drinking water," said Mark Norton, SAWPA Water Resources & Planning Manager. "While a sustainable global solution is in development, we want to remind our customers that their water is safe and tested daily to ensure it meets the highest state and federal standards before it reaches them."

Although water in SAWPA's geographical footprint is rigorously tested the region is home to large populations of immigrants who may have previously resided in countries where tap water is not safe to drink or they may have been taught by their immigrant parents that tap drink is not safe for human consumption. Consequently, they may still rely on boiling water before consuming it or they may depend on bottled water, water stores and/or water vending machines for the water they orally use and consume.

Clean, potable water other than tap water can present specific issues. Bottled water is tested less frequently than tap-water and is stored in plastic containers that may leach toxic chemicals. Currently, there are no testing standards for plastic bottles that can leach toxins into the water nor is testing done for possible bacteria that might form in water bottles.

Water from water stores is supposed to be monitored and regulated, but often inspections are not consistent and water quality can be unreliable. Customers' water jugs may also contain bacteria and bottles used to collect water from stores and machines are often used multiple times increasing the risk for bacterial growth. Individual, reusable water bottles should be washed thoroughly after each use and rinsed in clear, hot water to thwart the risk of bacterial growth.



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Another concern in not drinking tap water is the increase in consumption of sugary, high-calorie drinks, including soda, juice and sports drinks. Substituting these beverages for water can result in poor health habits and be a contributor to obesity and diabetes.

"Customers can also save money when they choose tap water; a gallon of tap water is less than .03 cents versus up to \$2.50 for a gallon of bottled water," said SAWPA's Norton. "Spending more on bottled water doesn't guarantee better quality. We recommend investing in a reusable water bottle to fill up with tap water or even use a home filter if you prefer the taste of filtered water."

Public tap water in the United States undergoes mandatory daily testing at certified laboratories as is required by the Safe Drinking Water Act. Water must meet or exceed the required standards and public water providers must provide annual water quality reports to its customers.

March 22 is International World Water Day. This specified day was established in 1993 by the United Nations and is held annually as a means of focusing attention on the importance of freshwater and to advocate for the sustainable management of fresh water resources. First time since 2011 no drought in California

You might think every water manager in the Golden State is sleeping soundly these days. L.A. rainfall is 158 percent of average. Ten of the 12 state reservoirs are filled to more than 100 percent of their historical average for mid-March — before the all-important **snowpack** which stands at 152 percent of normal has melted.

For the first time in 376 consecutive weeks, **not 1 acre of California is in drought**, according to new data released Thursday by The National Drought Mitigation Center, a joint project of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the University of Nebraska.

Yet, even with **all this wet news**, local water manager still preach conservation and worry the drought will return next year and the year after. Also, they face the very real threat of climate change reducing snowpack forever, which may force them to stop relying on the open spigot from Northern California to keep water flowing through customers' pipes and into SoCal homes and businesses.

"If you were to ask me when are you going to sleep soundly? Maybe after three-to-four years not only of above average rain, but rain we are able to capture," said Tony Zampielo, executive officer of the Main San Gabriel Basin Watermaster.

Zampielo and others are like bankers of water, socking away all they can in times of plenty for the nonrainy days to come.

"Yes, maybe we are out of the woods," he said. "But if we have another drought, that gallon of water you save today, you'll be drinking in five years."

It's all about groundwater


What he and other managers are concerned about is groundwater — parked throughout the region in various underground caverns — that supplies more than 60 percent of water for some areas. This water sustains life for tens of millions of Southern Californians as it is pulled up through wells owned by cities, for-profit water companies and mutual water districts.

But because of years of over-pumping to the point of wells going dry, the basins remain too low and have not returned to pre-drought levels. The damage from so little rain for so long will take more than one wet year to reverse, water experts said.

"When people open their umbrellas, they are not necessarily thinking we still have a long time to go to restore water levels of groundwater basins. One really wet year doesn't make up for 10 years of dry," said Robb Whitaker, general manager of the **Water Replenishment District of Southern California**, who manages two basins: Central and West coast, which include 43 cities from Norwalk to Hermosa Beach.

Drought eases

A comparison of drought conditions in the state from March 2016 to March 2019.



For example:

- The Orange County Ground Water Basin is about 78 percent full, up 12 percent from this time last year, according to John Kennedy, executive director of engineering and water resources. The basin serves 19 agencies and about 2.5 million people, the primary ground water source in Orange County.
- **Main San Gabriel Basin** is at about 60 percent or less. Another way to gauge the health is to measure the height of the water table. In 2010, before the drought kicked in, it was 237 feet above sea level. In November, it dropped down to 169.4 feet, the lowest in its history. As of Friday, it was at 182 feet, Zampielo said.

- Central and West Coast basins in Los Angeles County are about 60 percent full, Whitaker said. And that is after the rains rose the water table by 18 feet since March 2018, he said.
- San Bernardino Basin is filling up, but measurements won't be taken until November, said Craig Miller, **Western Municipal Water District's** general manager. "We know water is recharging into the aquifer because we are capturing rain water," he said, confidently.

Local runoff is key

The snow-capped San Gabriel's on Friday are more than a picture postcard to water folks. They are liquid gold. Water from this tremendous watershed is already flowing down the San Gabriel River until it reaches a rubber dam that slows the flow and diverts it to giant, spreading basins at the 605/210 freeways interchange near Irwindale. There, water stops and percolates into the groundwater basin.

In addition to local runoff, agencies will buy supplemental State Water Project water from Northern California. The San Gabriel basin will reach 195 feet by the end of December, he said, just shy of the safe operating level of 200 feet.

"The rubber dam is fully inflated," said Kelly Gardner, assistant executive officer of the San Gabriel Basin Watermaster during a tour Friday. "It allows the water to pass through the concrete juncture to the spreading grounds."

Water released beyond the Whittier Narrows Dam in Pico Rivera serves Long Beach and surrounding cities. All the cities in L.A. County must share this mountain water, according to a 1973 water rights adjudication in the courts. At first, about 700 acre-feet was let go to the ocean, but since the end of January, all the water in the soft-bottom San Gabriel River is captured and stored, Gardner said.

Just a few miles northeast of Irwindale, the Canyon Basin Spreading Grounds in Azusa are filling up with mountain runoff. Water managers can watch as the groundwater is replenished and dip in with wells that serve cities of Azusa and Glendora. This was working perfectly Friday, unlike during the drought years, when Glendora had to shut off some of its wells because they couldn't reach the shrinking aquifer.

The Inland Empire — both Riverside and San Bernardino counties — use water from the San Bernardino Mountains. For example, for the first time in 10 years, water is filling up behind the Seven Oaks Dam in Mentone, reaching 16,000 acre-feet of water. (One acre-foot is about 326,000 gallons or enough for a Southern California family for two years).

"For the last decade, we haven't been seeing that," said Miller. "It is a very good sign."

Adding other water

Orange County Water District gets 60,000 acre-feet annually from rainfall and 50,000 acre-feet from runoff coming down the Santa Ana River. But it also adds 103,000 acre-feet from its recycled sewage water system, the largest such system in the world, Kennedy said. The extra recycled water helps make the area nearly drought-proof.

"Orange County typically receives about 14 inches of rain and, so far, we've received just over 21 inches," he said. "But the next drought is around the corner. One wet year does not solve our water supply challenges, and we must all do what we can to practice ongoing conservation and support alternative water supply projects."

Typically, water from the Santa Ana River escapes to the ocean about five days of the year, Kennedy said. Zampiello said the San Gabriel River water is captured after a first blush of rain — which contains contaminants — 100 percent of the time. On the other end of the spectrum is the Los Angeles River — mostly concrete — which rarely captures any of its runoff.

Although contacted, the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power did not provide comments for this story.

By summer, the Water Replenishment District will have put into place its own a water recycling project that recharges groundwater levels. When that happens, it will no longer need to buy water from Northern California or the Colorado River, Whitaker said.

Conservation still preached

Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, the largest water wholesaler in the world, announced a plan last week with a goal of Southern California saving 180,000 acre-feet of water by 2040. The agency doubled its turf removal rebate to encourage removal of lawns.

Adan Ortega, a MWD director from Fullerton and former manager of MWD's water conservation efforts, said agencies need to tailor water savings to each community. For example, denser, lower-income regions don't have extensive lawns.

"We've got to get to the point where every community addresses its greatest source of water loss. Some places, its lawns. Other places, you have to replace the old, leaky pipelines," Ortega said.

ACWA, MEMBERS TESTIFY AT ASSEMBLY BUDGET SUBCOMMITTEE HEARING

ACWA staff and several coalition members testified today at the Assembly Budget Subcommittee No. 3 hearing to voice opposition to the proposed statewide water tax and support for a better approach in ACWA-sponsored SB 669, The Safe Drinking Water Trust.

Gov. Gavin Newsom has proposed a statewide water tax that is based on the SB 623 (Monning) framework and appears in budget trailer bill language. The Legislature's Budget Conference Committee rejected very similar language proposed by the Brown Administration in the State Budget process in 2018.

"We agree with the governor that there's a problem and we agree that there needs to be action this year, but this can be solved without a water tax," ACWA Deputy Executive Director for Government Relations Cindy Tuck testified at the hearing.

Tuck and other proposed water tax opponents noted several reasons for their opposition, including: it's bad policy to tax an essential resource; a tax would be costly for water systems to implement and manage, thereby increasing the cost of water to residents and businesses; and it would set a bad precedent for additional taxes on water.

ACWA and the California Municipal Utilities Association (CMUA) are sponsoring a better alternative in SB 669 (Caballero), which would help community water systems in disadvantaged communities provide access to safe drinking water. The Trust would be funded with an infusion of General Fund dollars during a budget surplus year. The state would invest the principal, and the net income would provide the needed ongoing revenue stream for drinking water solutions in disadvantaged communities

In addition to testifying at today's hearing and the Senate Budget Subcommittee No. 2 on Thursday, an ACWA-led coalition of more than 200 organizations submitted a letter to the

subcommittees to oppose the budget trailer bill language unless the water tax language is deleted.

SB 669 is expected to be heard by the Senate Environmental Quality Committee on April 10.

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PROPOSED WATER TAX BILL ADVANCES IN THE ASSEMBLY

A bill containing a modified version of Gov. Gavin Newsom's proposed statewide water tax passed out of committee Tuesday.

AB 217 (E. Garcia) was heard by the Assembly Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials Committee. ACWA has an oppose-unless-amended position on the bill with the primary concern being a proposed water tax.

ACWA Deputy Executive Director for Government Relations Cindy Tuck was among the witnesses to testify at the hearing. She told the committee that ACWA members agree that safe drinking water should be a priority for the state and that the problem can be solved this year.

Tuck noted several reasons for ACWA's opposition to a tax: it's bad policy to tax an essential resource; a tax would be costly for water systems to implement and manage, thereby increasing the cost of water to residents and businesses; and it would set a bad precedent for additional taxes on water.

She also thanked Assemblyman Eduardo Garcia for his willingness to listen to stakeholders in developing his bill and consider new ideas, such as a trust. Tuck noted that ACWA intended for the trust funding mechanism to replace the proposed water tax as opposed to adding to it.

In addition to the tax, the bill proposes agricultural assessments similar to those proposed in Gov. Brown's proposed budget trailer bill language in 2018, a modified version of ACWA's proposed Safe Drinking Water Trust and a commitment to allocate up to 20 % of the safe drinking water funds back to the region of the state in which they were raised.

The committee passed the bill by a 6-3 vote after the author accepted amendments that would require the public water systems to annually remit the tax collected to the State Water Resources Control Board in the amount of 50-cents per service connection. This amendment

was made to address the very high implementation costs of having a state tax on the local water bill. Tuck noted that even with the amendment, the proposal is still a water tax.

AB 217 now moves to the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

ACWA and the California Municipal Utilities Association (CMUA) are sponsoring a better approach in SB 669 (Caballero). The bill would create The Safe Drinking Water Trust to be funded with an infusion of General Fund dollars during a budget surplus year. The state would invest the principal, and the net income would provide the needed ongoing revenue stream for drinking water solutions in disadvantaged communities.

SB 669 is scheduled to be heard by the Senate Environmental Quality Committee on April 10.

The following tentative schedule is for your review and consideration. Final budget modifications will be adopted at the June 20, 2019 Board meeting.



Subject: Consideration to Authorize the Construction of GAC Treatment Addition for Well 4 at the Anita B. Smith Water Treatment Facility (Well 4 & 6)

BACKGROUND:

At the April 5, 2018 Board meeting, the Board authorized Krieger & Stewart to design a granular activated carbon (GAC) addition at the Anita B. Smith Water Treatment Facility. The proposal was requested due to the results of 1,2,3-Trichloropropane (TCP) being found in the raw water from the two co-located Wells (4 & 6). Over the course of the year, Staff has determined that GAC treatment vessels can be added on the existing property and can be phased for each Well on an as needed basis. Currently on Well 4 needs GAC treatment.

The maximum contamination level (MCL) for TCP is 5 ppt as set by the State. During 2018, the District took quarterly samples from Well 6 (2,000 gpm) which had measurable TCP levels, but the annual average was below the established MCL therefore the District is still able to use the Well. On the other hand, Well 4 (1,000 gpm) was sampled during the first quarter of 2018, and had levels of TCP that required Staff to take the Well out of service.

Given the significant impact these two Wells have on the District's overall production (approximately 40%), and the investment the District has put into treating these Well to remove Nitrates, abandoning the facility is not a practical option.

During the course of the preliminary design process, Staff determined that we could add GAC treatment without needing to acquire additional property. This fact, and our experience adding GAC treatment to Well 2 (behind the main office), Staff now proposes to act as our own general contractor to add the treatment equipment.

Since this is an emerging requirement, no Capital Improvement budget line item was previously established. Therefore, Staff requests authorization to expend up to \$325,000.00 from the water operating reserve fund account, which has a current balance of approximately \$2.9 million, to cover the estimated construction expenses.



RECOMMENDATION:

Pursuant to the Board of Directors, Staff is requesting authorization to establish a budget of and expend up to \$325,000.00 from the Water Operating Reserve Fund to cover the construction cost of the Wellhead GAC Treatment for Well 4 at the Anita B. Smith Water Treatment Facility.

Subject: Consider Approval of Resolution 2019-848 – A Resolution in Opposition to the Currently Proposed Southern California Edison Riverside Transmission Reliability Project

BACKGROUND:

The City of Riverside Public Utilities Department (RPU) is working with Southern California Edison (SCE) to establish a second power connection to the statewide power grid. RPU is the only large city in Southern California to have only one connection to the grid. Since 2006, RPU and SCE have been working on receiving local public agency support for this project.

In order to move forward, RPU requires a thorough Environmental Impact Report (EIR) approval process through the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC). The CPUC published the final version of the Subsequent EIR on October 2, 2018. More information can be found at the following website: <http://www.cpuc.ca.gov/environment/info/panoramaenv/RTRP/index.html>. The CPUC is expected to vote on this issue as early as summer 2019. If approved, the project is expected to "go live" by 2025.

Although the RPU supports requiring SCE to underground a portion of the project south of Limonite, adjacent to an approved residential development; RPU does not support undergrounding the remainder of the project due to the cost.

The RCSD is now being asked to express opposition to the proposed above-ground transmission line alignments through the City of Jurupa Valley, the Jurupa Community Services District, and Jurupa Area Parks & Recreation District.


While the project does not pass through any portion of the RCSD service area (as shown on the attached Map), and not directly impact the District, the Board may desire to “go-on-the-record” as opposing the project as currently proposed.

Draft Resolution 2019-848 has been prepared and is attached in the event the Board wishes to officially oppose the current project.

This is a Board Policy decision and Staff does not have a recommendation.



RESOLUTION NO. 2019-848

A RESOLUTION OF THE RUBIDOUX COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT BOARD OF DIRECTORS IN OPPOSITION OF THE PROPOSED SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON RIVERSIDE TRANSMISSION RELIABILITY PROJECT

WHEREAS, Southern California Edison ("SCE") and the City of Riverside Public Utilities ("RPU") are both project proponents of the development and implementation of the Riverside Transmission Reliability Project; and

WHEREAS, the Rubidoux Community Services District has the responsibility to ensure that all residents in the District, and the local community can live and work in a healthy and safe environment; and

WHEREAS, The California Independent System Operator (CAISO) in 2006 directed Southern California Edison (SCE) to build the Riverside Transmission Reliability Project (RTRP). SCE and RPU then proposed to build the 230-kV transmission line as an overhead transmission line constructed on lattice steel towers (LST) and tubular steel poles (TSP)—a portion of which are located in the City of Jurupa Valley; and

WHEREAS, as stated in the Final Subsequent Environmental Impact Report, this study (Wertheimer, N. and Leeper, E., 1979) observed a statistical association between the high-current configuration (the "wire code") of electric power lines outside of homes in Denver and the incidence of childhood cancer. The "wire code" was assumed to be related to current flow of the line; and

WHEREAS, on behalf of the CPUC, the California Department of Health Services (DHS) completed a comprehensive review of existing studies related to EMF from power lines and potential health risks. All three of the DHS scientists are inclined to believe that EMFs can cause some degree of increased risk of childhood leukemia, adult brain cancer, Lou Gehrig's Disease, and miscarriage; and

WHEREAS, as stated in the Final Subsequent Environmental Impact Report, Hazards and Hazardous Materials Section, potential impacts from hazards such as downed structures exist within the project, as proposed; and

WHEREAS, the citizens of Jurupa Valley may face negative impacts to property values and quality of life due to potential environmental impact to existing residential neighborhoods in the vicinity of the project; and

WHEREAS, the project, as proposed, would impede the construction of residential and commercial projects already entitled for development within the vicinity of the project; and

WHEREAS, as stated in the Subsequent Final Environmental Impact Statement, the alternative which undergirds the lines North of Limonite Ave. in Jurupa Valley is the environmentally superior alternative;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Rubidoux Community Services District opposes the Southern California Edison Riverside Transmission Reliability Project in its current state and supports the underground alternative in the City of Jurupa Valley.
